

Summer 2017 – Genesis 28: a rock, a hard place, a stairway and a gateway ... Part Two (14 May 2017, Paul Langham)

Reading: Genesis 28:1a, 3-5, 10-19 (NIV UK)

¹ So Isaac called for Jacob and blessed him. ... ³ May God Almighty bless you and make you fruitful and increase your numbers until you become a community of peoples. ⁴ May he give you and your descendants the blessing given to Abraham, so that you may take possession of the land where you now reside as a foreigner, the land God gave to Abraham.' ⁵ Then Isaac sent Jacob on his way, and he went to Paddan Aram, to Laban son of Bethuel the Aramean, the brother of Rebekah, who was the mother of Jacob and Esau. ...

¹⁰ Jacob left Beersheba and set out for Harran. ¹¹ When he reached a certain place, he stopped for the night because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones there, he put it under his head and lay down to sleep. ¹² He had a dream in which he saw a stairway resting on the earth, with its top reaching to heaven, and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. ¹³ There above it stood the Lord, and he said: 'I am the Lord, the God of your father Abraham and the God of Isaac. I will give you and your descendants the land on which you are lying. ¹⁴ Your descendants will be like the dust of the earth, and you will spread out to the west and to the east, to the north and to the south. All peoples on earth will be blessed through you and your offspring. ¹⁵ I am with you and will watch over you wherever you go, and I will bring you back to this land. I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you.'

¹⁶ When Jacob awoke from his sleep, he thought, 'Surely the Lord is in this place, and I was not aware of it.' ¹⁷ He was afraid and said, 'How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God; this is the gate of heaven.'

¹⁸ Early the next morning Jacob took the stone he had placed under his head and set it up as a pillar and poured oil on top of it. ¹⁹ He called that place Bethel, though the city used to be called Luz.
²⁰ Then Jacob made a vow, saying, 'If God will be with me and will watch over me on this journey I am taking and will give me food to eat and clothes to wear ²¹ so that I return safely to my father's household, then the Lord will be my God ²² and this stone that I have set up as a pillar will be God's house, and of all that you give me I will give you a tenth.'

3 Gateway

Jacob arrives at this 'certain place' unaware that he is accompanied

He leaves it aware that he is accompanied

Not a bad definition of conversion

A meeting place

Under the New Covenant, we know that Jesus is the Gate (John 10); he is the point of meeting. We want people who do not know that they are accompanied, to become aware of that ...

- Whole point of 'Thy Kingdom Come'

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement, which invites Christians around the world to pray between Ascension and Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. What started out as an invitation from the Archbishops' of Canterbury and York in 2016 to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer. The hope is that:

- people will commit to pray with God's world-wide family as a church, individually or in other groups;
- churches will hold prayer events, such as 24-7 prayer, prayer stations and prayer walks, across the UK and in other parts of the world;
- people will be empowered through prayer by the Holy Spirit, finding new confidence to be witnesses for Jesus Christ.

Here at Christ Church, we are responding to this call in the following ways

Daily Prayer in Jacob's Well (or wherever you are – details overleaf) – 7.00 am, 12 noon, 7.00 pm

From 25 May to 3 June, we will be praying three times a day – each half hour will focus on a different sphere of life or church outreach. Most days, there will be someone in Jacob's Well at these times – however, we know that many people will be away or otherwise unable to come to Jacob's Well during this time: please still answer the call to prayer wherever you are.

Pray

- for specific individuals, asking the Holy Spirit to supply the names (Zacchaeus)
- for our own witness ...

Each day, we will be sending out a 'Daniel's Windows' bible reflection to help us focus

Wednesday 24 May – We suggest that it would be good for us all to fast in some way on this day, as we prepare to pray for family, friends, neighbours and colleagues to come to know Jesus Christ.

According to Colossians 3 we declare that there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all.

We declare we will work for unity and justice in this City and seek reconciliation and equity across all current divides

The church in the Bristol region will tell the good news of Jesus, will have a voice in the market-place and will reach out to the un-churched, young and old, rich and poor.

We proclaim that Jesus is Lord in Bristol.

So we declare there is One Lord of One Church in One United City.
