Can we trust the gospels?

2 criteria:

- how near to the events they were written
- how many copies still survive

Plato

- ➤ 427-347 BC, Athens
- Less than 10 surviving copies of his writings
- ➤Oldest 1400 years later

Tacitus

- **≻**100 AD , Rome
- 8 surviving copies
- ➤Oldest 1100 AD (1000 years later)

Homer

- ➤wrote the Illiad 900 BC
- ►643 copies
- ➤Oldest copy 10th-C AD
- (over 2000 years)

¹ Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, ² just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eye witnesses and servants of the word. ³ With this in mind, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, I too decided to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, ⁴ so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught. ¹ Among the many records of the extraordinary things that have happened in our days, ² reported by the original eyewitnesses, ³ mine is the result of painstaking research to ensure that what I write is accurate and faithful. So this is for you, my dear Theophilus, ⁴ to reassure you that what you have been told really happened.

⁵ In the days when Herod was the Roman Empire's puppet-king of Judea, there was a Jewish priest named Zechariah. ⁶ He and his wife Elizabeth were godly people and lived out the Jewish Law faithfully. ⁷ The only thing missing from their lives was a child and at their age they knew all hope of being parents had gone.
